

This is a 4000 **character** document in which students have the opportunity to tell the course administrator why they are suitable for their course.

They should:

- Be concise
- Talk about their skills and experiences, both inside and outside of Sixth Form, and provide examples using the ABC model (Activity, Benefit, Course)
- Summarise why they are a suitable applicant for the given course

They should not:

- Use cliché quotes
- Declare their 'passion' for the subject
- Write generically about their A Level courses
- Make the statement specific to one university

If students are applying for joint honours or differing courses, they may be asked to provide an additional personal statement. For Arts based courses they are likely to be asked to produce a portfolio of their work in addition to the personal statement.

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The UCAS Process

All students have been encouraged to sign up to UCAS Hub and enter their basic information whether they intend to apply for university or not.

We encourage students to be as honest as possible on their applications to ensure the right support is in place for them when they arrive.

Once they have completed their application and personal statement, students will need to pay and send their application.

This is paid by debit card directly to UCAS and costs £27.50. If your child's course requires an entrance test, these will come an additional cost and should they should liaise with Mrs Bennett in exams if these need to be sat in school.













The UCAS Process

Once the application is sent it comes to the Sixth Form Team so students should complete a UCAS ready to send form (available form Study6) and submit it to me. The Sixth Form Team then check the application and personal statement and add the academic reference.

Only once the application has been completed and quality assured will it be sent to UCAS and I will inform students of this by Teams message.









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Some universities will make offers immediately, others will wait until the application deadline in January.

Offers are usually conditional (based on the student achieving the set entry requirements) occasionally a contextual conditional offer will be made due to circumstances unique to the student.

Unconditional offers are made by certain universities, these are offers which set no grade expectations for the student to achieve and offers them a place regardless of their summer exams.

We do not recommend that students accept unconditional offers as their firm choice as research has shown that doing showing, on average drops a student's average grade by 2 whole grades as they disengage and coast to the finish.















Some courses require students to attend interview, students should inform us of these as soon as they are aware so that we can arrange mock interviews for them.



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Students will apply for a maximum of 5 courses but will only be able to make a firm and insurance choice.

Once students have all their offers they can they choose these and decline the other others.

Occasionally, there are instances where a student receives 5 rejections, here they can enter UCAS Extra and make an additional application at no extra cost.











Applying for degree apprenticeships

Students applying for a degree apprenticeship should meet with Ms Pollard this month to identify their area of interest and gain support with their curriculum vitae, these meetings can be booked through Mrs Neville.

Virtual or telephone interviews

As part of the application process students may be asked to undertake a virtual or telephone interview, we are happy to facilitate this happening within the Sixth Form or can authorise for the student to complete this at home.



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Assessment Days

Some businesses invite candidates in for an Assessment Day, this may involve tasks that assess:

- Problem solving
- Communication
- Leadership
- Initiative

Ms Pollard will be able to support students prior to these.











Face to Face interviews

Again, as with university interviews, students should let us know about these as soon as possible so that we can arrange a mock interview for them.
