

Dear Parent/Carers

Thank you for your continued support in working with us to maximise your child's attendance. We know that good attendance supports effective learning and future success in school.

We aim to offer welcoming, nurturing, and supportive environments to enable all students to learn and be successful but there is a strong reliance on positive relationships with you. We always look forward to celebrating the positives, but we are also here to ensure supportive, early action can be taken if concerns arise. We encourage you to work with us to help address any attendance concerns.

Every student should aim for 97-100% attendance. Parents have a legal responsibility to ensure their child attends school.

The attendance and punctuality of students is monitored daily. We work closely with the Local Authority who support us if we need to issue a fixed penalty notice for students who are persistently absent from school. The Local Authority is also responsible for pursuing court action if poor attendance continues.

In this newsletter we will try to answer some questions that arise regularly about attendance.

Is my child 'too ill' for school?

There are clear government guidelines for schools that say when children should be kept off school and when they shouldn't.

The below guidance has been taken from the NHS website and includes information on common childhood illness.

Coughs and colds

It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or cold.

Encourage your child to throw away any used tissues and to wash their hands regularly.

Headaches

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have a headache. Advise them to take painkillers.

Sore Throat

You can still send your child to school if they have a sore throat.

Menstrual Cramps

School should not be missed due to 'the time of the month'. It's important for your child to have pads or tampons with them at all times. The Welfare Department have emergency products available should a child not have access to them.

Conjunctivitis

You don't need to keep your child away from school if they have conjunctivitis.

Vomiting and diarrhoea

If a child has vomiting or has diarrhoea, keep them off school. You can usually treat your child at home. The most important thing is to have plenty of fluids to avoid dehydration.

Abbey College does not operate a 48 hour return to school policy following an illness/sickness bug. Your child should return to school at the earliest opportunity.

To allow us to safeguard our students it is important that we receive a message on each day of absence. The exception to this, is in the instance of a planned prolonged period of absence.

When reporting a student's absence, it is important that you clearly state the following:

- Student's name
- Student's year group
- Reason for absence
- Your name and relationship to the student

Simply stating that you child is "unwell" or "poorly" is not sufficient reason for an authorised absence.

If we do not receive notification of a student absence, a telephone call/ text will be made to the parent of any child who has not reported their absence on the first day that they do not attend school.

If there is still no confirmation of a reason for absence, then it will be marked on the student's attendance record as an unauthorised absence. An unauthorised absence affects your child's attendance percentage.







Appointments and non-attendance

Appointments

Please try to arrange hospital, doctor, dentist and other appointments outside of the school day. Where this is not possible please ensure that your child misses the smallest amount of time possible. Where possible, arranging an appointment for 2:30pm rather than 9:30am will greatly reduce the amount of lesson time missed.

Issues at School

If you choose to keep your child out of school while issues are being resolved, this will be classed as unauthorised. We cannot support you or your child if they are not at school.

Holidays

Any request for leave of absence during term time should be in writing to the Headteacher via our Leave of Absence form which can be found on our website. It will be the decision of the Headteacher as to whether the leave is authorised.

However, as a matter of policy, **Abbey College will not authorise holidays in term time.** Depending on the length of the holiday, a Fixed Penalty Notice or fine could be imposed.

Lateness

The school days starts at 8.40am. Any student who arrives after this time but before 9.10am will receive a late mark.

Students who arrive after 9.10am will have an unauthorised attendance mark (U) for the morning session, unless medical evidence can be provided.



Frequently Asked Questions about Attendance

If my child is late, is this an absence?

It depends....If your child arrives during Form Time, they would be marked as L, Late. This is not an absence but does impact on your child being ready to learn, receiving important information and having some time with their peers. If your child arrives after the register has closed, but during the morning session, they will be marked U. This <u>is</u> an absence. If your child is late to school they will need to complete a 1 hour detention.

Why does the school require me to update my contact details?

When your child is at school the school have 'loco parentis' however, in the case of an emergency they have to contact you to obtain permissions.

How many days does my child have to attend school?


The law regulations state that children have to be given 190 days of education per year.

Why does the school need me to contact them every day if my child is poorly?

The school cannot assume your child is at home, they have a safeguarding duty to know where your child is. If they have been ill the day before and we don't get a call/email from you we have to assume they are on their way to school.

Under what circumstances would my child's attendance information be shared?

We share statutory attendance concerns with the Local Authority and the Early Help Team.





Addressing Poor Attendance

Absence & the Law

The September 2022 DfE Attendance Guidance remains non-statutory but with an expectation that all schools and academies follow it. We welcomed the emphasis it placed on parents, local authorities, other agencies, and schools/academies to work collaboratively together to support students' education and wellbeing. It also gave some useful key messages to remember:

- · Attendance affects, and is affected by, all parts of a child's life, it should not be viewed in isolation, and whole family plans are crucial to supporting children and families.
- · Attending school regularly is important for learning and is the law.
- · Schools are expected to promote attendance and explore all absence (authorised and unauthorised) if it falls below 96% to support students and families to prevent further absence.
- · Where a child is enrolled in a school they must attend regularly and although legal action is a last resort, it will be considered if the support to improve attendance is not engaged with.
- · Parents are required to ensure their child receives full time education under Section 7 of the Education Act 1996. Legal Action for failing to do so is used under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996 and/or Section 23 of Anti-Social Behaviour Act 2003 for Penalty Notices (fines).



What can parents/carers do to help?

- Report absences daily and on time.
- Encourage your child to attend school regularly.
- Arrange all non-urgent medical appointments out of school hours.
- > Support your child's education by ensuring they arrive to school on time.
- ➤ Encourage resilience and self-sufficiency in your child.
- Keep holidays for the holidays.
- > Be mindful of your child's attendance.
- ➤ Work with us, if there is a barrier to your child attending school regularly, we are here to listen and help.
